The Challenge

- Over 5 million Americans have significant speech-related disabilities
 - Autism, cerebral palsy, intellectual and developmental disabilities
- Limited educational opportunities often result in low levels of literacy, employment, and community participation
- Augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) can support communication and participation
- Pre-service programs at colleges and universities must prepare teachers and speech-language pathologists (SLPs)¹ to support AAC



Role of the AAC Learning Center

The AAC Learning Center provides support for pre-service and in-service instruction in AAC. AAC Learning Center activities include:

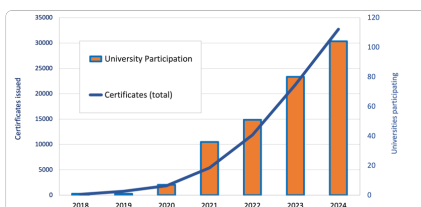
- Webcasts (31)

- On-line learning modules (11)
 - Co-authored with AAC users
 - Video, text, interactive activities
 - Guided notes
 - Assessment activities
 - Certificates of Completion
- Supports for in-class activities



Uptake and Feedback

AAC Learning Center modules are in use at over 100 colleges and universities, and pre-service teachers and SLPs completed over 10,800 modules in 2023-2024.

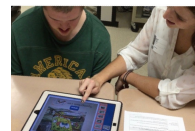
- Over 95% of students who complete a module would recommend the Learning Center to other students



Research on Impact of Modules

Adapted Literacy Instruction²

- 90% of people who need or use AAC do not have functional literacy skills
- SLPs and teachers who participated in training demonstrated significant gains in instructional skills with children who need AAC³
- Completed by 3,740 pre-service professionals



Culturally Responsive Practice⁴

- Children of color are more likely to have severe disabilities, and less likely to receive needed AAC services
- Pre-service professionals who participated in training demonstrated significant gains in the knowledge, skill, and disposition for CRP⁵
- Completed by 160 pre-service professionals



Family Centered Services⁶

- Parents of children who need AAC report that SLPs and teachers do not provide family-centered services
- Pre-service professionals who participated in training demonstrated significant gains in knowledge, skill, and disposition for FCS⁷
- Completed by 670 pre-service professionals



Visual Supports for Communication⁸

- Visual supports can enhance participation and communication
- Pre-service professionals who participated in training demonstrated significant gains in knowledge, skill, and disposition for visual supports⁹
- Completed by 440 pre-service professionals



Under Development

First-Person Narratives on Impact of AAC¹⁰

- Only 10% of adults with developmental disabilities who need AAC, have access to AAC
- To raise public awareness and expectations, we are sharing webcast presentations from the Future of AAC Research Summit (2024)



AI Support for Content Area Reading¹¹

- Students who use AAC do not receive needed supports to take rigorous academic classes
- This module will provide instruction and practice in using AI to create individualized reading materials for use in content area classes



Development Process

Development Process

- Topics are identified by people who use AAC
- Content is written by
 - People who use AAC,
 - Family members of people who use AAC
 - PSU faculty and graduate students
- New modules are evaluated with Penn State students in special education, general education, and speech language pathology, and then made freely available
- OSEP supported scholars have investigated impact of 5 modules and co-authored peer-reviewed publications and presentations^{3,5,7,9}
